City Manager Report to City Council for the Meeting of Monday, December 19, 2016

PUBLIC HEARINGS ON LEGISLATION

1) Ordinance No. 55-2016 – City Council Salaries

This Ordinance was introduced on December 5, 2016. It amends Section 121.03 of the Codified Ordinances related to City Council salaries. Pursuant to a recent change in the City Charter, it provides for a one-time increase in the Council members' salaries (provided to all Council members at one-time, in-term). As introduced, it increases the salary to \$600 per month or such greater amount that will be the minimum to qualify for full-time service credit under the Ohio Public Employees Retirement System and provides an additional \$100 per month for the President of Council. (Note: OPERS has indicated the minimum monthly amount to qualify for full-time service credit in 2017 will be \$630 and in 2018 will be \$660.) It changes the disbursement of the salary from per meeting to monthly.

2) Ordinance No. 45-2016 – 2017 Operating Budget

This Ordinance adopts the City's annual budget for Fiscal Year 2017 and appropriates sums for current operating expenses. In fulfillment of Section 4.02 of the City Charter, the City Manager submitted the Preliminary Budget to the City Council in October. (The Proposed 2017 Operating Budget presented in October is available on the City's website at <http://worthington.org/index.aspx?nid=101>.) Since then, the City Council held a series of budget workshops. This Ordinance was introduced with blanks pending the conclusion of the budget presentations. The recommended amounts are included in the enclosed Ordinance No. 45-2016 (As Amended).

The 2017 Operating Budget presented for approval varies from the proposed budget submitted in October in the following ways:

- a) The amount budgeted for Refuse Collection in line 101.1120.540535 has been increased from \$950,000 to \$977,205 to reflect the actual costs we expect based on the bids we received for refuse collection and recycling processing.

- b) The amount budgeted in line 101.1010.511007 for compensation for the Clerk of Council has been increased from \$1,500 to \$2,000 to reflect expected compensation associated with City Council meetings if the Clerk decides to elect financial compensation rather than compensatory time.
- c) The amounts allocated to community groups have been revised to correct for an inaccurate allocation in the proposed budget. The amount budgeted in line 101.1180.560987 for Community Arts funding has been adjusted from \$7,500 to \$4,982 and the amount allocated in 101.1140 for Special Groups has been adjusted from \$106,000 to \$108,535. The total allocation remains essentially the same; the split across the two areas was corrected. These amounts reflect a 2.5% increase from 2016 funding levels in each of these areas.

Listed later on this agenda is Ordinance 55-2016, which increases City Council salaries. The enclosed Ordinance No. 45-2016 (As Amended) includes funding for a monthly salary of \$630 for Council members, which is the minimum amount necessary to qualify for fulltime service credit under the Ohio Public Employees Retirement System, and an additional \$100 per month for the President of Council. This is consistent with Ordinance 55-2016 as it was introduced.

Recommendation: Motion to Amend the Ordinance and Approval of Ordinance as Amended

3) Ordinance No. 51-2016 – Appropriation – Central District Sanitary Sewer Improvements

This Ordinance appropriates \$66,350 for engineering services related to sanitary sewer improvements on East North Street and Morning Street. These improvements were recommended in the Central District Sanitary Sewer Study. Staff is recommending DLZ Ohio for the work. Additional information is included in the attached memorandum from the Director of Service & Engineering.

Recommendation: Approval of the Ordinance as Presented

4) Ordinance No. 52-2016 – Planning & Zoning Code Changes

A review of the City's Planning & Zoning Code has identified errors that were made when changes were adopted. These changes related to the portion of the Code that addresses Planned Use Districts, retaining walls in the setback, and the Wilson Bridge Road zoning districts. This Ordinance corrects the errors. Additional detail regarding the corrections is included in the attached memorandum from the Director of Planning & Building.

Recommendation: Approval of the Ordinance as Presented

5) Ordinance No. 54-2016 – Appropriation – New & Replacement Equipment & Various Projects

This Ordinance appropriates funds to procure the new and replacement equipment provided in the Capital Improvements Plan (CIP) for Fiscal Year 2017. It allows the cost of an individual piece of equipment to exceed the amount budgeted by up to 10% as long as the total amount of all equipment is within the budgeted amount.

The Ordinance also appropriates funds for 19 projects in 2017 in the Capital Improvements Plan, (a) 2017 Building Improvement Program, (b) Service Facility Grit Pad, (c) Sewer Repair near Kilbourne Building, (d) Fleet Garage Ventilation System, (e) Community Center Shutdown Improvements, (f) Fire Station Roof Replacement Design, (g) Municipal Building Roof Replacement Design, (h) Municipal Building Window & Door Replacement Design (i) Fuel Dispensing System & Tank Farm Replacement Evaluation (j) Upper Rush Run Stream Restoration Study, (k) Community Center Window Replacement, (l) 2016 Urban Forestry Restoration Program, (m) McCord Park Master Planning, (n) Dog Park Parking Lot Addition, (o) Olentangy Parklands Tennis Court Fencing, (p) Irrigation Controller Replacements, (q) Granby Street Drainage, (r) CBD Paver Renovation and (s) Community Wayfinding Signage. The size and scope of these projects are below the threshold required for formal bidding under the City's purchasing policies. (Note: The 2017 Building Improvement Project is budgeted at \$75,000. It will be a series of smaller projects which individually will involve different vendors and will be below the bid threshold.)

Recommendation: Approval of the Ordinance as Presented

NEW LEGISLATION

6) Resolution No. 62-2016 – Grants – Old Worthington Partnership & Worthington Historical Society

The Old Worthington Partnership and the Worthington Historical Society presented their grant requests for 2017 during the City Council's budget workshop on November 21st. At that time, City Council was also provided copies of their grant applications. This Resolution approves the grant amounts for 2017. The Resolution includes the amounts requested by the two organizations.

Recommendation: Introduction of the Resolution and Approval as Presented

7) Resolution No. 63-2016 – Right of Way Permit – AT&T

Section 949 of the City's Codified Ordinances requires that persons desiring to utilize the City's Rights of Way to provide public utility and/or telecommunications services, other than cable television service, obtain a Telecommunication and Utility Permit. The City has received an application from AT&T Ohio for renewal of its permit. This Resolution

authorizes the City Manager to sign the Telecommunications and Utility Permit for the use of the Rights of Way in Worthington. The permit is for three years.

Recommendation: Introduction of the Resolution and Approval as Presented

8) Resolution No. 64-2016 – Appointments – Municipal Planning Commission (MPC) & Architectural Review Board (ARB)

The terms of two Municipal Planning Commission members have expired. The City Council has asked that they be presented for re-appointment for an additional three-year term. This Resolution appoints Michael Coulter (currently Chair) and Tom Reis.

The Architectural Review Board is made up of the members of the Municipal Planning Commission and two additional members appointed annually by the City Council; one of these members shall reside in the Architectural Review District. The City Council has asked that current members, David Foust and Amy Lloyd, be presented for continued service and appointment to one year terms. This Resolution provides for these appointments.

Recommendation: Introduction of the Resolution and Approval as Presented

9) Resolution No. 65-2016 – Appointments – Worthington International Friendship Association (WIFA)

The terms of six members of the Worthington International Friendship Association (WIFA) are expiring and are recommended for re-appointment. WIFA also recommends the appointment of four additional people who represented Worthington and WIFA on the 2016 delegation to our sister city, Sayama, Japan. This Resolution makes those appointments.

Recommendation: Introduction of the Resolution and Approval as Presented

10) Liquor Permit – TREX – Borgata Pizza Bistro – Wine Bar LLC

This is a request for Borgata Pizza Café at 2285 W. Dublin Granville Road. The request is for a D2 permit which is for wine and mixed beverages for on premises consumption or in original sealed containers for carryout only until 1:00 a.m. City Council is requested to make a motion regarding whether to object to the permit. The liquor permit request is attached.

This is an Economic Development Transfer (TRES) permit. City Council endorsed the transfer as an economic development project on October 17th and declined to object to the transfer of D1 and D3 permits for beer and spirituous liquor on September 19th. Staff is unaware of any reason to request a hearing related to the issuance of this liquor permit.

Recommendation: Approval of a Motion to NOT request a hearing for the transfer of the Liquor Permit

11) Public Notices of Public Hearings on Ordinances and Budget Estimates

On December 12th, the City Council discussed the new City Charter changes related the issuance of notices for public hearings on ordinances and budget estimates. The Charter indicates the City Council must designate annually the method used to issue the notices. The Charter indicates the manner can be “once in a newspaper of general circulation in the Municipality” and/or “posted on at least one electronic medium”. During the discussion, City Council asked that this agenda item come back for the adoption of a motion to publish the notices electronically on the City’s website with announcements in various places about the change in the publication location. Staff has prepared the motion below for utilization by the City Council.

The discussion on December 12th also included the various other public notices issued by the City that are currently published in the public notices section of *The Columbus Dispatch*. These other notices are dictated by the City’s Codified Ordinances so staff is preparing ordinance(s) to bring back to City Council after the first of the year to allow those notices to also be placed on the City’s website. The memorandum from the Assistant City Manager provided for the December 12th discussion is attached in this agenda packet for background information.

Recommendation: Approval of the following Motion: For 2017, notices of public hearings on ordinances and budget estimates will be published in a public notices section of the City’s website (www.worthington.org). Staff is directed to promote the availability of these notices on the City’s website at least quarterly via press release and/or newspaper ad, and through the City’s communication vehicles, including the City’s website News Flash, Neighborhood Network and social media.

EXECUTIVE SESSION

ORDINANCE NO. 55-2016

Amending Section 121.03 of the Codified Ordinances of the City to Establish the Salary of Council Members.

WHEREAS, in 1957 City Council voted to raise the salaries of its members from five dollars per meeting to twenty-five dollars per meeting and in 1988 the amount was raised to fifty dollars per meeting, these being the only times since 1957 that Council salaries were raised; and

WHEREAS, the Worthington Charter Review Commission recommended to Council that the Charter be amended to allow for one raise for all Council members to take effect at the same time, with no salary increases thereafter taking effect during a Council member's term of office, it being the conclusion of the Charter Review Commission that the salaries of Worthington's City Council are low, especially in comparison to most other jurisdictions in Central Ohio; and

WHEREAS, on November 8, 2016, the voters of the City of Worthington approved the recommended amendments to the Charter, including the provision authorizing the one-time adjustment to the City Council salary; and

WHEREAS, Section 121.03 of the Codified Ordinances establishes the salary of Council members and the President of Council.

NOW, THEREFORE BE IT ORDAINED by the Council of the City of Worthington, County of Franklin, State of Ohio:

SECTION 1. That Section 121.03 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Worthington be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

121.03 SALARY OF COUNCIL MEMBERS.

Effective January 1, 2017, the salary of each member of Council shall be set at the rate of \$600.00 per month or such greater amount that will be the minimum to qualify for full-time service credit for the Ohio Public Employees Retirement System. The President of Council shall receive an additional \$100.00 per month. Any increase in salary as a result of changes to the OPERS minimum full-time service credit amount shall not take effect for any Council member during such Council member's term of office. No salary shall be decreased during the term of office of a Council member except with the consent of such member.

ORDINANCE NO. 55-2016

SECTION 2. That notice of passage of this Ordinance shall be posted in the Municipal Administration Building, the Worthington Library, the Griswold Center and the Worthington Community Center and shall set forth the title and effective date of the Ordinance and a statement that the Ordinance is on file in the office of the Clerk of Council. This Ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after the earliest period allowed by law and by the Charter of the City of Worthington, Ohio.

The Central District Sanitary Sewer Study identifies several sewer deficiencies needing repair.

The first step in that process is soliciting engineering services to design the fix for these deficiencies. One critical area is at the intersection of E. North St. and Morning St. Several sub-basins drain to an obsolete system of multiple manholes. Undersized piping limiting capacity in these sub-basins intensifies the problem and puts the system at risk of overflowing due to lack of efficiency. We are seeking qualified engineering of the system in this area to alleviate all deficiencies and eliminate the risk of eminent sanitary sewer overflows. DLZ has conducted a study of the area and has data and knowledge necessary to do the design work

Staff recommends approval by City Council to enter into an agreement with DLZ to engineer and design the project. With approval, we plan to proceed immediately to complete design and solicit bids for construction in 2017.

SECTION 2. That Section 1141.06 of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Worthington be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

1141.06 PLANNED USE DISTRICTS

Areas for a mixture of land uses that are compatible with each other and adjacent development with creation of development standards and design characteristics to promote the housing and economic development goals of the City; provide for supporting community facilities; and ensure integration and conformity with the community.

SECTION 3. That Section 1180.02(a) of the Codified Ordinances of the City of Worthington be and hereby is amended to read as follows:

1180.02 "R" DISTRICTS

(a) In any "R" District, no fence or wall shall be erected in the area between the right of way line and the building setback line except for a wall necessary to accommodate differences in grade. No fence or wall in an "R" district shall exceed a height of six feet.

SUBJECT: Planning & Zoning Code - Corrections

City Council has approved several amendments to the Planning & Zoning Code. It has been determined that in the course of approval of those amendments, certain errors were inadvertently made that require correction. These amendments have been made to the Planning and Zoning Code regarding Planned Use Districts, retaining walls in the setback and the Wilson Bridge Road zoning districts.

1. 1141.01 DIVISION INTO DISTRICTS

The City is hereby divided into districts under ~~four~~ six general categories which shall be known as: Open Area Districts, Residential Districts, Commercial Districts, Industrial Districts, Planned Use Districts and Wilson Bridge Corridor Districts.

- Added Planned Use Districts and Wilson Bridge Corridor Districts to the six general zoning categories vs. the previous four general categories.

2. 1141.06 PLANNED USE DISTRICTS

Areas for a mixture of land uses that are compatible with each other and adjacent development with creation of development standards and design characteristics to promote the housing and economic development goals of the City; provide for supporting community facilities; and ensure integration and conformity with the community.

- Section 1141.06 described Planned Use Districts before the Wilson Bridge Corridor Zoning changes were made. The zoning legislation changed Section 1141.06 to refer to the Wilson Bridge Corridor Districts and Planned Use Districts were deleted; this ordinance reinserts the original Planned Use District definition as 1141.06 and adds a new Section 1141.07 for the Wilson Bridge Corridor Districts.

3. 1180.02 “R” DISTRICTS

(a) In any "R" District, no fence or wall shall be erected in the area between the right-of-way line and the building setback line except for a wall necessary to accommodate differences in grade. No fence or wall in an "R" district shall exceed a height of six feet.

- The underlined text was inadvertently left out when this section of the Code moved from the Chapter 13 Building Code to Chapter 11 Planning & Zoning Code in 2010.

4. 1181.04 GENERAL PROVISIONS

(d) Redevelopment and/or change of use proposals in the WBC shall be a minimum of 2-acres of land and 200’ of frontage along the Right-of-Way.

- The minimum acreage that was discussed throughout the Wilson Bridge Corridor Zoning amendment process in all the drafts and presentations that were presented to the general public, ARB, MPC and ultimately City Council for approval referenced a minimum of 2 acres required for redevelopment. The original set of drafts incorporated a 3-acre minimum and the change was not carried over into the final document.

5. 1141.07 WILSON BRIDGE CORRIDOR DISTRICTS

Refer to Section 1181.06 of the Codified Ordinances for the Wilson Bridge Corridor Districts.

- As mentioned in item 2 above, this is the new section created to describe the Wilson Bridge Corridor Districts by referring to Section 1181.06.

SUBJECT: ADOPTION OF PUBLIC NOTICE PROCEDURES

BACKGROUND

The Charter Review Commission recommended, and the voters approved, City Charter amendments regarding the manner in which the City gives notice of public hearings on ordinances and budget estimates. The Charter changes require City Council to designate the manner in which these notices will occur. There are a number of other public notifications throughout the City's Codified Ordinances that can be considered if the City wants to have consistency in the way it notifies the public. These areas will be detailed later in this memorandum.

City Charter

Included below are the sections of the recently amended City Charter related to this issue. Emphasis has been added to illustrate the statement that most directly relates to the topic to be discussed.

SECTION 2.17 PROCEDURE IN THE PASSAGE OF ORDINANCES

... The Clerk of Council shall cause a notice of public hearing on the ordinance to be published, in a manner determined annually by Council, once in a newspaper of general circulation in the Municipality prior to the scheduled hearing date, and/or posted on at least one electronic medium. Such notice shall contain the title of the ordinance or a succinct summary of the title,

the time, date, and place of the public hearing, and a statement that the ordinance is on file for public inspection in the office of the Clerk of Council. . . .

SECTION 4.03 PUBLIC HEARING ON BUDGET ESTIMATES

At the meeting of the Council at which the budget estimates are submitted by the City Manager, the Council shall schedule a public hearing on the budget. *A notice of public hearing shall be published once in a newspaper of general circulation in the Municipality and/or on the electronic medium determined by Council pursuant to Section 2.17 of this Charter, at least seven (7) days before the hearing.* Such notice shall state that the budget estimates and message are on file for public inspection in the office of the Clerk of Council. On the date and at the time and place advertised, the Council shall hold a public hearing on the estimates as submitted and may continue such hearing. After the hearing, the Council shall adopt by ordinance the estimates as submitted, or as amended, as the appropriations budget of the Municipality for the ensuing budget year. Adoption of the budget ordinance shall require a majority vote of the members of Council.

Codified Ordinances

The City's Codified Ordinances reference public notifications, which are done by publication in a newspaper of general circulation in the city (*The Columbus Dispatch*), in a number of areas:

1. Meeting Notices of Municipal Public Bodies
 - a. CHAPTER 109 NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARINGS defines the procedure for issuing public notices for meetings of public bodies associated with the City. These bodies are defined in this section and include City Council and the commissions, boards and committees of the City. The notices of regular and special meetings are published in a newspaper of general circulation in the city and posted at the office of the Clerk.
2. Notice of Public Hearings
 - a. CITY CHARTER 2.17 PROCEDURE IN THE PASSAGE OF ORDINANCES - As noted above, the City Charter addresses the notice for public hearings on ordinances. City Council must specify the manner of publication annually.
 - b. 1127.03 CONDITIONAL USE PERMITS - Requires notice of the Municipal Planning Commission hearing on the application be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the city and be posted on the property in question.
 - c. 1129.03 BOARD OF ZONING APPEALS – HEARINGS - Requires notice of the Board of Zoning Appeals hearing on the application be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the city and be posted on the property in question.

- d. 1145.02 PROCEDURE FOR CHANGE IN ZONING DISTRICTS – Requires notice of the City Council hearing on the application be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the city and be posted on the property to be zoned or rezoned.
 - e. 1174.08 PUD PROCEDURES - Requires notice of the City Council hearing on the application for Planned Unit Development be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the city and be posted on the property in question.
 - f. 1177.03 ARCHITECTURAL DISTRICT - APPLICATION AND NOTICE - Requires notice of the hearing on the application be published in a newspaper of general circulation in the city and be posted on the property in question.
3. Purchasing/Bidding
- a. 111.04 FORMAL BIDDING; NOTICE AND EXPENDITURE – Requires advertisement of the bid once each week for two consecutive weeks in a newspaper of general circulation in the city or in professional or trade magazines appropriate for the purpose.
4. Hiring/Recruitment of Employees
- a. 139.07 DEPARTMENT OF PERSONNEL - RECRUITMENT AND SELECTION – Requires advertisement for application for personnel vacancies in at least one newspaper of general circulation in the City and in such other media as may be deemed expedient.
5. Other
- a. 925.02 WATER CONSERVATION EMERGENCY; RESTRICTIONS – When Council determined by resolution that an emergency exists requiring the conservation of the water supply of the City, the resolution is required to be published once in a newspaper of general circulation in the City.

In 103.05, the Codified Ordinances state a “newspaper of general circulation in the Municipality is defined according to Section 7.12 of the Ohio Revised Code. The Ohio Revised Code defines it as a publication bearing a title or name that is regularly issued at least once a week and that meets all of the following requirements:

1. It is printed in the English language using standard printing methods, being not less than eight pages in broadsheet format or sixteen pages in the tabloid format.
2. It contains at least twenty-five percent editorial content, which includes, but is not limited to, local news, political information, and local sports.

3. It has been published continuously for at least three years immediately preceding legal publication by the state agency or political subdivision.
4. The publication has the ability to add subscribers to its distribution list.
5. The publication is circulated generally by United States mail or carrier delivery in the political subdivision responsible for legal publication or in the state, if legal publication is made by a state agency, by proof of the filing of a United States postal service "Statement of Ownership, Management, and Circulation" (PS form 3526) with the local postmaster, or by proof of an independent audit of the publication performed, within the twelve months immediately preceding legal publication.

DISCUSSION

Notice of Public Hearings on Ordinances

As was noted in Section 2.17 above, City Council must determine annually how it will provide notice of public hearings on ordinances. Currently, the Clerk of Council submits the notice to *The Columbus Dispatch* for publication in the Legal Notices section. The Charter amendment provides for the notice to be published in the current manner *and/or* posted on at least one electronic medium such as the City's website. When a notice is posted on the City's website, a notification can be generated and sent to people that have signed up to receive a notification when a new notice is posted. This could utilize the Notify Me function on the City's website which generates emails and text messages to subscribers when a specific event occurs.

Notice of Public Hearing on the Budget

The City currently utilizes the same procedure for noticing the public hearing on the budget as it does for noticing public hearings on ordinances. This procedure involves publication in the Public Notices section of *The Columbus Dispatch*. For consistency, the City could handle the notice of public hearing on the budget the same way the City chooses to handle notices of public hearings on ordinances. Thus, when the City Council designates the manner in which notices of public hearing on ordinances will be handled, it could designate the same procedure for notice of the public hearing on the budget.

Potential Changes to Codified Ordinances

If the City wants to have consistency in the way public notices are provided, it could modify the Codified Ordinances, as necessary. If the City continues to use a newspaper of general circulation as its primary method of public notice, the Codified Ordinances can stay unchanged. However, if the City wants to incorporate electronic notification in place of the newspaper of general circulation, then Code changes are needed. As was noted above, there are several categories of items noticed in the newspaper. Notification method could be consistent across all

of them, or it could vary by category. Consistency within each category can help the public know where to look for the notifications.

Discussion by the Charter Review Commission

The Charter sections items were discussed by the Charter Review Commission on March 21st, April 18th, and May 16th. Minutes of those meetings are available on the City’s website under the Charter Review Commission. A summary of the Charter Review Commission’s recommendations on this topic is included in the Charter Review Commission’s report, which is attached to this memorandum. The Commission recommended maintaining the newspaper publication requirement, but adding a requirement for an electronic method of notification for public hearings on ordinances and budget estimates.

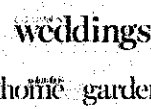
EXAMPLES AND COST OF PUBLICATION

City staff provided background information for the Charter Review Commission regarding the cost of newspaper publication of notices. Attached to this memorandum are two examples of notices and the cost of each. The City annually spends an average of \$23,500 for public notices. The notices are run in the Public Notices section of the newspaper, which is located adjacent to the classified advertisements. The average annual spending amount is broken out across various categories of notices below.

Announcement of Public Meetings	\$5,500
City Council Public Hearings	\$7,000
MPC/ARB Public Hearings	\$5,000
BZA Public Hearings	\$2,000
Bids	\$4,000

NEXT STEPS

In order to meet the requirements of the new City Charter language, City Council should approve a motion indicating the method by which the City will provide notice of public hearings on ordinances and budget estimates. If the City Council would like to amend the Codified Ordinances, staff can prepare ordinances to bring back for Council consideration.
